# Summer Adventure Highlights for the Class of 2028

This OMS-2, Shri Gandham, summer, participated in the iCORE (Interdisciplinary Collaborative Research) Training Program affiliated with the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai in New York, NY. Here is what Shri said about his experience: "Over nine weeks, I contributed to two clinical research projects in the emergency department at Mount Sinai Morningside with the potential for future publication. The first project I worked on focused on investigating whether patients boarded in the emergency department experience a higher risk of falls compared to those admitted. The findings from this research helped us understand the potential adverse effects of prolonged boarding in the Emergency Department. The second project I contributed to focused on reducing alarm frequency by customizing cardiac monitor parameter settings, ultimately aiming to improve staff response

times and patient safety. In addition to research , I had the privilege of shadowing, my mentor Dr. Samuel Sondheim, MD, MBA, in the ED and building meaningful connections. It was an incredibly rewarding experience!"





This summer, OMS-2 and Health Professional Scholars Program (HPSP) student, Josef Asaad, went to Wright Patterson Air Force Base for a 10 day training. He recapped his experience: "During this training I learned what it meant to be a Flight Surgeon and the different sub specialties that went along with it. I was given the opportunity to fly an SR-22 in order to really understand the physiological toll flying takes on a person. From this I also learned the different hazards and forces that act on the body during flight. At the end of the training we were given 2 days of chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear and explosive explosives scenarios, (CBRNE) training. We were put into hazmat gear and we ran mass casualty scenes that could be seen in the military [and learned] to triage the injured and coordinate response. Communication and teamwork are key. We were taught various trauma techniques such intubation, needle decompression, tracheostomy as well as basic trauma first aid. The experience was unforgettable.

This summer, OMS-2, Alli Halbleib, and 10 other LECOM-SH students traveled to the Dominican Republic for a volunteer medical service trip with a program called the Kerolle Initiative. During the 10 day experience, Alli stayed with a host family in the village of Bella Vista where she was immersed in the language and culture of the Dominican Republic. Alli and other students participated in health clinics in remote and underserved areas of the country traveling by safari bus and even trekking through rivers to reach the communities they served. Students also conducted research on the perception of diabetes in the communities, and presented posters at a health fair. About the experience, Alli said "The experience was both inspirational and humbling. Staying with the host family truly immersed us into their way of life. We saw firsthand how social factors affect their health outcomes. The trip solidified my passion for healthcare, especially caring for those who are in the most need.

This Summer, OMS-2, Andrea Krolikowski, became a member of the Pennsylvania Radiological Society. She also became the liaison between this organization LECOM-SH. In addition to joining to organization, Andrea also started working on an ultrasound research project this summer with Dr. Cummings and with one goal of adding ultrasound education to the first year curriculum. Along with that Andrea is in the RAD-AID Medical Student program. RAD-AID is an organization made to answer the need for more radiology and imaging technology in the resource-limited regions and underserved communities of the world. The organization brings radiology to lowresource areas by delivering education, equipment, infrastructure, and support. In joining this program, Andrea will soon apply for fieldwork with their teams and complete a field project in the future.





# **SGA Updates and Upcoming Events**


